



Individual Liberties Certificate

The goal of the Individual Liberties Certificate is to provide students with an understanding of the substantive and procedural aspects of criminal law, as well as an in-depth knowledge of individual liberties and rights as they relate to citizen-government relations. This Certificate is appropriate for any student planning to attend law school, planning to seek employment in a law office, public sector, criminal justice agency, etc.

Required Courses (6 hours)

Students are required to complete the following courses:

- PLA 3306 Criminal Law (3 hours)
- POS 4604 American Constitutional Law II (3 hours)

Electives (9 hours)

Students are required to complete **three (3)** courses from the following list. Students **must** satisfy the prerequisites if any for each course before enrolling in the class.

- PLA 4020 Law and Society (3 hours)
- PLA 4022 Contemporary Issues in Law (3 hours)
- PLA 4886 Sexuality, Gender, & the Law (3 hours)
- POS 4622 Politics and Civil Rights (3 hours)
- CPO 4784 Political and Economic Inequality in Comparative Perspective (3 hours)
- INR 4075 Human Rights Policy (3 hours)
- PUP 3314 Minorities in American Politics (3 hours)
- POS 4623 Guns, Freedom and Citizenship (3 hours)
- POS 3234 Protest in American Politics (3 hours)

Other important things to know:

- 15 total hours for the certificate.
- A minimum overall GPA of 2.0 is required in courses used to satisfy the certificate.
- Internship or Independent Study credit cannot be used towards the certificate.
- Students are required to take courses as specified and to declare the certificate.
- Students must satisfy the prerequisites, if any, for each course before enrolling in the class.
