For students in the master's/ specialist programs, it generally takes 6-7 semesters to complete the program as a full-time student. For students in the doctoral program, it generally takes 3 full years to complete the program as a full-time student. To account for both full and part time students, we use a 4-year benchmark from start to completion. Those who do not complete within the 4-year time span typically finish within 5 years (UCF has a mandatory 7-year completion policy).

[^] Based on 2022 scores, these pass rates represent those who passed the exam in the reporting year. ^^ The National Board for Certified Counselors (NBCC) provides the State of Florida with exam pass rate information. In 2022, 62 UCF students/alumni took the National Clinical Mental Health Counselors Exam (NCMHCE) and 45 passed the exam. As a comparison, for the entire state of Florida, the pass rate of all test-takers in 2022 was 47%.

In 2022, 6 UCF alumni took the exam and 5 passed on their first attempt. In 2022, the first-time pass rate for the entire state of Florida was not reported: as a comparison, 63% of UCF alumni passed the exam in 2021.

^{^^^} Students in the School Counseling track (MA, MEd, & EdS) must pass their state qualifying exams during their internships and cannot graduate until they do so. Thus, all students who graduate from the School Counseling track have passed their state qualifying exams.
