

Program Description

Overview

UCF's Master of Arts program in Career & Workforce Education (CWE) prepares students pursuing teaching, leadership, and administrative positions in career and workforce education (CWE) as well as workforce education, talent development, and corporate training.

The CWE MA degree program is housed within the College of Community Innovation and Education, Department of Educational Leadership and Higher Education.

This program is designed for individuals whose goal is to teach, train, coach, and/or lead in specific disciplines located in the following institutions: local school districts; private and public post-secondary schools (career centers; technical, community, and state colleges; universities); vocational rehabilitation centers; correctional institution vocational education programs; CTE and workforce associations (such as <u>FACTE</u>, <u>ACTE</u>, <u>CTSOs</u>, <u>AdvanceCTE</u>, <u>ATD</u>); military trainers and veterans; workforce talent development organizations; nonprofit organizations; and state/government workforce agencies. To prepare students in these endeavors, assignments, activities, and research within the courses in the CWE Programs reflect two teaching standards: Florida Educator Accomplished Practices (<u>FEAP</u>) and National Board for Professional Teaching Standards for CTE Teachers (NBPTS).

The program also has a focus on the practice of applying contemporary career and workforce research and scholarly writing to real-world practice. Critical thinking skills are infused into the curriculum as the program adequately prepares students to research, write and prepare to submit articles for publication in related technical specialization professional journals/magazines. Discipline specific knowledge, skills, attitudes, beliefs applicable to graduates from this program are explicit requirements in the areas of critical thinking, planning for instruction, and communication skills.

CWE Graduate Program Vision Statement: All career and workforce education leaders are academic scholars.

CWE Graduate Program Mission Statement: To provide opportunities for system leaders to critically analyze career and workforce history, programs, issues, and trends.

Our Goal: The Career and Workforce Education graduate programs place an emphasis on the students' development of academic research and scholarly writing that contribute to strong leadership skills in their individual fields of study.

Program Learning Outcomes

Learning Outcome 1: Demonstrate knowledge of historical vocational and economic events, social movements, and legislative acts that have a direct impact on current career and workforce education in the U.S.

Learning Outcome 2: Analyze the components of a career and workforce education curriculum program using an appropriate needs assessment plan and program evaluation model.

Learning Outcome 3: Construct a publishable scholarly secondary research article regarding an issue that focuses on curricular, instructional, demographic, and/or trends in career and workforce education.

Online Track: Career and Workforce Education M.A. degree is offered fully online. Students may choose the online only track or a regular track. The CWE core courses are offered online only. If a student wishes to take elective courses on-campus, they may choose the regular track. Consult with advisor for more information. Online track students are supported by an online Success Coach.

International students (F or J visa) are required to enroll in a full-time course load of 9 credit hours during the fall and spring semesters. Only 3 of the 9 credit hours may be taken in a completely online format. For a detailed listing of enrollment requirements for international students, please visit http://global.ucf.edu/.

UCF is authorized to provide online courses or instruction to students in all states. Refer to State Authorizations for current information.

Curriculum

The Career and Workforce Education MA program requires a minimum of 39 credit hours beyond the bachelor's degree, including 18 credit hours of career education core courses, 18 credit hours of advisor-approved courses focused on specialization within a discipline, and a 3-credit intern or research report course.

The six Career Education Core courses combine to provide students with an in-depth analysis of career education from its inception to future trends. With 18 credit hours (six courses) in core career education graduate courses and 18 credit hours (six courses) in a discipline-specific field of study, the student will be considered a subject matter expert in career and workforce education **AND** a subject matter expert in a discipline-specific field.

The internship/directed-field experience course (3 credit hours) <u>OR</u> a research report course (3 credit hours) is required at the end of the program of study.

Passing a comprehensive examination at the end of the program is a graduation requirement.

Please note: The Career and Workforce Education Programs are not initial teacher certification programs.

Career Education Core Courses: 18 Credit Hours

These courses will provide a solid foundation in career and technical/workforce education. The courses are only offered once a year in the semester as indicated.

Elective Courses in Specialization: 18 Credit Hours

Elective courses in a specialization may include career and workforce education (CWE), health, technical training, corporate training, adult education, business education, or any other specialization within one of the <u>career clusters</u>. Specialization courses are to be approved by the advisor. Students who wish to specialize in career and workforce education may choose from the following list of elective courses. The courses are only offered once a year in the semester as indicated.

Internship Option: 3 Credit Hours (CH)

The internship course is a learning activity that takes place in a face-to-face or web-based authentic setting in which students must apply, reflect upon, and refine knowledge and skills acquired in the program. The Academic Program Coordinator will assist in the internship arrangements. The internship experience gives students insight and hands-on experience while being observed and mentored by a supervising teacher and a UCF faculty member.

Research Report Option: 3 Credit Hours (CH)

This research report course is the program mini-thesis option. Students will engage in secondary research and review of literature in a field of study related to CWE. Students who wish to go onto to a doctorate program may wish to choose this option.

Comprehensive Exam

The purpose of the comprehensive exam is to evaluate the student's mastery of the field of Career and Workforce Education. The comprehensive examination is a 3-day at home research paper based on instructions provided by the Academic Program Coordinator. The method and procedure for examination will be discussed with the Academic Program Coordinator during the first GPS/Orientation session. The dates for the comprehensive exam will be provided by the student, usually the semester before graduation and must be approved by the Academic Program Coordinator/Faculty Advisor.

Results of the exam will be submitted to the Office of Graduate Studies, College of Community Innovation and Education by the Academic Program Coordinator/Faculty Advisor. The exam is prepared by the Academic Program Coordinator. The result of the comprehensive examination will be one of the following:

- PASS with a recommendation that the student be cleared to receive the degree.
- FAIL stipulating the conditions that must be met before the student is eligible to take the exam the second time.
- The comprehensive exam may not be taken more than two times. A review
 period of not less than 90 days or more than one year after the student is notified of
 the results of the first examination is required before a second exam may be
 completed. The Faculty Advisor or Department Chair may impose conditions for a
 second exam.

Comprehensive Exam Checklist

- Meet with Academic Program Coordinator/Faculty Advisor to review Graduate Plan of Study.
- Discuss Comp Exam with Academic Program Advisor and select dates.
- The Program Coordinator will email official Comprehensive Examination results to you two weeks after exam.

Academic Integrity

Filing Your Intent to Graduate

The ability to file online opens at mid-term of the semester **prior** to the semester of graduation. Intents to graduate should be filed online no later than the last day of registration for the semester of graduation.

Below are the steps for indicating your intent to graduate.

- Complete required and elective coursework with a GPA of 3.0 or above.
- Pass the comprehensive examination.
- Schedule an appointment with your <u>Advisor the semester</u> <u>BEFORE</u> you wish to graduate to review your Plan of Study.
- Students who intend to graduate must complete the online Intent to Graduate Form by logging into myUCF and navigating to the Student Self Service— Other Academics > Intent to Graduate: Apply.

- Students must be enrolled in the term they are graduating.
- If your record is placed on hold, please refer to Record Holds in the <u>Student</u> <u>Handbook</u> for information on how to satisfy the hold requirements.
- Please refer to the <u>Academic Calendar</u> for dates to apply for graduation.
- If you are unable to graduate in that semester, a new online form must be filed at the beginning of the semester of anticipated completion.
