Resume Basics

What is a resume and why is it important? Fundamentally, a resume is your calling card; it encompasses the brand that you are selling to employers in order to get hired. There are three types of resumes, each containing personal, educational and experiential background. These include chronological, functional, and combination resumes which includes skill sets and employment history. Here are some tips for writing the perfect resume:

• It is important to tailor the resume and cover letter in response to a specific position. Place the most recent accomplishments at the top and work your way down. Remember that these documents are going

to be competing for priority against everyone else. Make sure to highlight all your great assets.

- The art of a great resume is in storytelling. You want your resume to be something to be admired and idealized, and you want to use your background to emphasize why you should be hired. Tell the truth and don't be afraid to market yourself.
- Following your initial draft of your resume, be sure to enlist the
 proofreading expertise of your colleagues. Get as many eyeballs as you
 can to review it before submitting to prospective employers. There are
 peer advisors at the Office of Experiential Learning who can critique
 your drafts. It would be wise to attend a resume workshop as well.

Use your cover letter to compliment the resume and to add information not listed otherwise. There should be three main components:

- 1. The introduction
- 2. The body
- 3. The conclusion

Start by explaining how you learned about the job, who you are, and what you know about the organization. Use the body to explain how you would be an asset to the company, use your experience as evidence. Elucidate how you are the ideal candidate. Conclude by thanking the employer for their consideration and offer to come in to interview and discuss your qualifications further.

Try to keep your cover letter, as well as your resume, to single pages. Send thank you notes after meeting in person and wait for an offer.

There are so many resources available to you that you will become an expert in time. Once you are hired and move up the ranks, perhaps you can pay your good fortune forward by hiring SPA alumni. Good luck and have fun with all of your success!

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

Research Conference 2016

More than 100 scholars, practitioners, and students recently attended the School of Public Administration's 10th Annual Public Administration Research Conference, hosted at the FAIRWINDS Alumni Center on April 8.

This year's theme focused on the growing use of social media in government and nonprofit agencies. Social media tools, such as Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram — to name a few — are becoming prevalent ways to connect with users in a rapid format. Presentations at the conference touched on several emerging issues regarding the tools such as public records concerns, negative comments, and employee time dedicated to using the platforms strategically.

Academic keynote speaker Lori Brainard, Ph.D., from George Washington University presented her findings on how policing agencies use the tools. Her findings show that police departments need to improve how they use social media to communicate with users, ideally to improve relations. Practitioner keynote speaker Teresa Tatlonghari, the vice president of marketing for Orlando City Soccer Club, showed attendees how her organization continues to grow its social media following by sticking true to the organization's brand values of family and community. Dr. Erik Johnston of Arizona State University wrapped up the day with his talk on the future of digital research, showing how citizens can make changes in their communities based on "big data" findings.

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APA National Conference 2016

Planning's new landscape: This was the theme for the 2016 American Planning Association's National Planning Conference. This year, 11 University of Central Florida students had the opportunity to attend the conference held in Phoenix, Arizona. The students who attended included

Dean Fathelbab, David McMahan, Leny Huaman, Joshua DeVries, JP Mansolf, Hector Guerrero, Christina Hyson, Tarik Milner, Shane Carman, Slade Davis, and Evan Futch. Attendance by these students was made possible by extensive fundraising efforts of the Urban Knights Planning Student Organization, and through generous donations and contributions.

While the conference had a specific theme, there was a wide variety of workshops, sessions, vendors and networking opportunities. The flight over the snow-capped Rocky Mountains, the Tonto National Forest, and into Phoenix (Valley of the Sun) was just the beginning of an amazing journey. The keynote speech, awards luncheon, networking receptions, student poster presentations, and numerous informational sessions provided each of the 11 students with a unique and enriching experience.

DeVries said that the students were able to further their bond with their fellow UCF family by exploring Downtown Phoenix, experiencing the local culture, learning about the functionality of an effective public transportation system through active use, hiking Arizona Mountains and visiting the Grand Canyon.

DeVries and Futch presented the process and results of the M.S.-URP Studio project during the student poster exhibition. The Wildwood Parks and Recreation Plan poster drew a number of enthusiastic conference attendees, including Richard J. Dolesh, the vice president of the national recreation and parks association. Other memorable sessions included the keynote address, awards luncheon in which participants witnessed the current and former APA Presidents discuss nationally recognized plans and processes, breakout sessions explaining public-private partnerships, and workshops demonstrating new technologies that provide for better regulation of short-term rentals. One of the students had the pleasure of meeting and discussing this new technology with Jeff Goodman, an APA Journalist who was published on the subject in the February 2016 issue of the APA Planning Magazine.

Hyson expressed interest in a session focused on equity planning and the dynamics involved in community revitalization. She enjoyed hearing the presenters share their experiences on working in a small, underprivileged

community in South Carolina. Having learned about social justice as part of several planning courses in the M.S.-URP program, she found the information both informative and inspiring.

On behalf of the Urban Knights Student Planning Organization, we would like to thank the great members of the School of Public Administration, Planning Advisory Board, the Student Government Association, the American Planning Association, and the numerous contributors who made this worthy trip possible. It was truly a memorable experience that will be cherished as we continue to expand our education and develop our careers in the planning profession.

Abstract:

An overview of how geographic issues have become increasingly relevant to public health research and policy, particularly through the lens of GIS. We will cover several areas: scale; geographic variability; neighborhood effect; distance decay behavior; regionalization; and geographic disparities vs. equality. Each area will be illustrated mainly by case studies from the presenter's research projects supported by the NIH.

Biography:

Fahui Wang, PhD, is an internationally renowned expert in Geographic Information Systems, applications in the social sciences and public policy, and most well-known for his groundbreaking work on spatial analysis methods and related applications in urban studies, public health and crime analysis.



Wang received his bachelor's degree in geography from Peking University in China, his master's degree in economics and doctorate in city and regional planning from The Ohio State University.

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Citizen Participation and Public Administration

In this exclusive article by Associate Professor Jay Jurie, Ph.D., he discusses the issues surrounding citizen participation, particularly voting rights and representation in congress. Below is an excerpt of the article:


"Arguably the most critical problem is the issue of class. Various sources indicate the cost of running a credible campaign for a seat in the U.S. House at around \$1.5 million, and for a seat in the U.S. Senate, at around \$10 million. This puts electability well beyond the means of the so-called middle class, at least those without connections to moneyed interests or unable to raise substantial funds on behalf of their candidacy.

This raises two additional issues that have become part of the contemporary political debate. One is how well those constantly in search of funding for electoral campaigns can meaningfully address other concerns, and closely related, the other is the degree to which elected officials represent the specific concerns of the affluent rather than those of

the wider public. Both of these issues serve to isolate elected officials from broad sectors of their constituency. It can be pointed out virtually identical issues are found at the state and local levels.

Similarly, these concerns are reflected in the administrative bureaucracy. While it is generally understood administrative agencies are created by and serve at the pleasure of the elected branches of government, it is likewise understood they reflect the purposes and priorities of those branches. In other words, if the elected branches reflect certain values and predispositions, so will the administrative agencies."

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How Do Plans Become Reality? Faculty and Students Explore Strategic Implementation

America currently faces a government problem, as a majority of its citizens do not trust the public sector and believe that private and nonprofit avenues are more effective to achieve societal change.

Although much of this is perceptual, governments in general have not been effective in achieving the promises made through various strategic plans.

A School of Public Administration research team, comprised of David Mitchell, Ph.D., Master of Public Administration students Claudia Colantonio and Christina Nguyen, and an incoming faculty member, are working with a nationwide sample of local governments to identify the

reasons why some municipalities are more successful than others in achieving their strategic goals.

To date, the research has demonstrated that success depends upon matching the implementation approach to the project's priority level and complexity. Ultimately, the team hopes to study over 1,500 municipal strategic initiatives in order to determine the best implementation practices for recommendation to local governments, which could ultimately improve government effectiveness and prestige.



SPA Plans for the Future

As the School of Public Administration continues to grow, the faculty and staff have begun the process to identify a strategic plan for the next five years. To do this, the school has enlisted the help of three students from this semester's graduate strategic planning and management course, under the direction of David Mitchell, Ph.D.

To date, the school—along with input from advisory boards and students—has conducted a review of its mission, vision, and values and determined its strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. Based on this review,

strategic issues and goals will soon be identified, along with strategies to achieve them. The School plans to approve of the 2016-2021 strategic plan in May.

Student's Perspective: City of Orlando Internship

In my short time working with the City of Orlando's Housing and Community Development Division, I've already gained some valuable experience. I have been living in Central Florida for about two years now and it is my second semester in the M.S.-URP program at UCF. I pounced on the opportunity to learn more about my new home and participate in something so meaningful.

My internship focuses on fair housing and consolidated planning, data-driven and public processes that examine Orlando's impediments to fair housing as defined in the Fair Housing Act, as well as affordable housing, community and economic development to assist the city in identifying its needs and priorities for the most vulnerable populations. The data that I help collect and analyze will be utilized in the formulation of a five-year strategic plan to address these needs. Part of this initiative entails working in close coordination with Orange County and a number of nonprofit organizations, public citizens and other stakeholders. I've already had the opportunity to participate in an affordable housing focus

group hosted by Orange County and a fair housing workshop co-hosted by the City of Orlando and Orange County to discuss regional impediments to fair housing, as well as solutions to mitigate these impediments.

Although the consolidated and fair housing plans will be based primarily on quantitative data, focus groups and citizen participation serve to provide qualitative data; thus, creating a more comprehensive study analysis. I'm looking forward to learning more about how the City plans to address impediments to fair housing, affordable housing and community development needs.



Research administrators are part of a unique professional field having their own distinct and expansive body of tacit knowledge. Substantial time and resources are required to initiate an incoming research administrator to the profession, and their turnover can be costly to an institution. In addition, the need for seasoned research administrators is expected to increase rapidly in the coming years. Researcher administrators that have mastered this unique body of knowledge, and those that have honed specific skills ,are better prepared to avoid costly errors and create optimal solutions to complex problems. Results of the study are expected to be publish by the end of 2016.



The Function of Public Procurement in Public Service

Visiting Instructor Joshua
Steinfeld recently conducted a
study of public procurement
that focuses on the translation
of public policy initiatives into
tangible provision of public
goods and services for
communities.

The study specifically focuses on the roles and responsibilities of public procurement practitioners, which is centrally important to understand how the public is served according to budgetary allocations that are dictated by public policies.

Steinfeld argues that it is important for public managers and community

residents to understand whom public procurement officers are and what they do.

"Identifying the job positions and occupational duties assumed by public procurement practitioners enables public managers to be accountable for their work and provides a mechanism for the public to contribute to public policy outcomes through their own assessment of government's execution as users and consumers of public goods and services," Steinfeld wrote.

Faculty Research



Vistas Project

Our sponsorship of an AmeriCorps VISTA project, funded by the Corporation for National and Community Service, is in its third, and final, year. VISTA volunteers continue to provide capacity building of the homeless education programs of Brevard, Orange, and Seminole Public Schools, and to programming for homeless students at the University of Central Florida through the Office of Student Rights and Responsibilities. In 2014-2015, the VISTA project facilitated service delivery to 10,805 disadvantaged youth, capacity building to 110 organizations, recruited 410 volunteers, and the provision of \$67,000 in cash donations and \$27,000 in in-kind donations.

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

Coordinator Finishing European Visit

Ph.D. track coordinator and Center for Public and Nonprofit Management Director Thomas Bryer, Ph.D., is completing a nine-week visit to Europe, where he has been working as a Fulbright scholar in the Faculty of Social Sciences, Arts, and Humanities at Kaunas University of Technology in Lithuania.

During the past two months, Bryer has been conducting research on citizen participation with municipal governments in Lithuania, including how municipal governments are using social media technologies for interaction with citizens. He delivered eight lectures in undergraduate and graduate classes on a range of subjects, and he delivered presentations for Kaunas City Municipality by invitation, one on social media and the other for the community of non-government organizations and the challenge of building government-NGO partnerships.

His research, in coordination with the Municipal Training Centre at the university, has also taken him to Latvia, Netherlands, and Poland during these two months. Bryer will repeat this two-month visit again in 2016 and 2017.



Bryer Assisted by Ph.D. Students

During his two-month visit in Lithuania, Bryer was assisted remotely by public affairs Ph.D. student Wanzhu Shi, and, within Lithuania, by Ph.D. student Ieva Aurylaitė. Both Shi and Aurylaitė are interested in research on social media; Shi is currently completing dissertation research about social media use by NGOs in the United States for stakeholder engagement. Aurylaitė is developing a research plan for her future dissertation research that may consider various participation forms and communication strategies of social media. Bryer hopes both might have a chance to meet at the 10th Annual Public Administration Research Conference, which this year has a theme of "Social Government: Developments in Digital Democracy."

NSF Grant Update

Through funding by the National Science Foundation for project titled *Collaborative Research: Pervasive Spectrum Sharing for Public Safety Communications*, Naim Kapucu, Ph.D., is collaborating with principal investigators from the University of Nevada-Reno, Virginia Tech, and Florida International University. Specific for the University of Central Florida, Kapucu is researching and examining key policies and regulations related to wireless communication and spectrum sharing within an public safety context.

The major goals of this research project are to address these challenges by introducing a novel, interdisciplinary framework for modeling, designing, simulating, analyzing, and operating large scale sharing of wireless resources in PSC scenarios.

Working alongside Kapucu is doctoral student Brittany Haupt who is focusing on interoperability of emergency management communication systems along with connections to resilience capacity of local communities. In addition, she is researching the effect on vulnerable populations.

Within the first year of the project, Kapucu the collaborators dis cussed key findings at the annual meeting for the Association of Public Policy Analysis and Management and generated a website for Pervasive Spectrum Sharing for Public Safety

MRA Students and Faculty Attend the Society of Research Administrators International Meeting in Las Vegas

The UCF Master of Research Administration program was well-represented at the SRAI Annual Conference this year. I am excited to announce that four M.R.A. students were selected to present at this year's annual conference and two M.R.A. instructors also presented. This clearly demonstrates the leadership role and the attitude of service to the

profession our students' and faculty exemplify. During the conference the UCF M.R.A. Exhibit Booth was very busy talking with research administrators about pursuing a professional graduate degree in research administration. There were 10 M.R.A. alumni and students also attending the conference. Jo Smith, Ph.D. also served as one of the judges for the symposium paper presentations.

Presentations:

Mir Asghar Ali Khan (M.R.A. 2016) — Khan presented "Managing a Sub-award from U.S. Entity in a Developing Country." His presentation focused on helping other research institutions understand how they were able to reach consensus at Aga Khan University, Pakistan, on awards having multiple U.S. provisions, most of which many developing countries have never encountered. In addition to describing their processes, Khan shared tips from and for other U.S. research administrators to consider when developing a sub-award to an outside U.S. organization facing similar issues (IRB, HIPAA, export controls, animal rights, foreign tax status, etc.). In addition, he made the same presentation for research administrators and faculty during a visit to the UCF campus on Oct. 26. Khan is a research manager at the Aga Khan University, Pakistan.

Anastasia (Annie) Lenfest and Kirsten Torguson (M.R.A. 2013) -

They co-presented "SBIR/STTR: Increase Your External Funding through Collaborative Research with Industry." The presentation provided helpful information for research administrators assisting principle investigators in understanding and preparing federally-funded Small Business Innovation Research/Small Business Technology Transfer (SBIR/STTR) grants. The session provided an overview of SBIR/STTR programs, the federal agencies who fund SBIR/STTR grants, eligibility requirements, and how universities, hospitals and research institutes can participate. They also discussed tips and tricks for developing a strong application and budget, as well as how partnerships with small businesses benefit everyone. Lenfest is a research program officer at Western Michigan University and Torguson is the director of sponsored research services at the Keck Graduate Institute and an adjunct instructor for PAD5850 in the nonprofit management program at UCF.

Jean Mercer (M.R.A. 2015) - She co-presented a roundtable discussion with Tammy Good at the SRAI Annual Conference. The roundtable discussion allowed research administrators in departments and central offices to openly discuss common communication issues, how to break down barriers and increase collaboration. The ultimate goal of the session was to improve communication and collaboration between these offices to more effectively support the research infrastructure within their own institutions. Mercer is the director of grant services at Indiana University.

Douglas Backman (Instructor - PAD6747) - Backman co-lead a Learning Café Session with Susan Wyatt Sedwick, They exchanged ideas, responded to questions, and shared solutions related to common complications that may occur when university researchers are affiliated with the startup as an owner or advisor. The session shared some effective practices for managing the inherent conflicts of interest that seem to plague many of these projects. Backman is director of compliance for the Office of Research and Commercialization at UCF.

Jennifer Shambrook, Ph.D. (Instructor - PAD6744 & PAD6745) - Shambrook co-presented with Robert Shambrook on a half-day workshop session titled "Communicating as a Leader: Public Speaking with Credibility and Confidence." This workshop enabled participants to learn and apply the essential elements of public speaking necessary to become skilled, confident and credible speakers in any venue. Shambrook is the director of research operations at UCF.

Symposium Paper Presentation:

Shambrook was one of four chosen for the symposium paper presentations. She presented a paper titled "Results of the 2015 RASPerS: Stress, work-life balance, and health behavior." This paper was coauthored by James Thomas Owens, Ph.D., UCF College of Education; and Shiva Jahani, Ph.D., UCF Center for Multicultural and Multilingual Studies.

Service Learning Project

This semester. PAD 6397 (Managing Emergencies and Crises) is working directly with the Florida Emergency Preparedness Association on a service learning research project titled "Critical Incident Stress of the Local Emergency Manager in the United States." Claire Knox, Ph.D., will submit a white paper based on the students' research reports to Director Alan Harris (Seminole County Office of **Emergency Management) in** December and will present the results at FEPA's Annual Meeting in February. FEPA will use this product to advocate for legislation to (1) identify the local emergency management staff as special or high risk and (2) develop programs to help local emergency managers deal with stress.

n=17; Spring 2014 *n*=21; Fall 2014 *n*=35). The discussion encouraged students to contemplate how their biases, preconceived notions, and stereotypes affect their future role in emergency management.

Findings: Results from Likert scale pre/post tests showed a marked increase in knowledge and a positive change in attitudes (p < 0.05). Open-responses denoted linkages to the prejudice reduction model and cultural identity development theory.

2015-16 M.S.-URP Studio Project

The UCF urban and regional planning program has partnered with the

City of Wildwood to develop a Parks Plan for the 2015-2016 Planning Studio. The general purpose of the Planning Studio is to conduct an analysis and develop recommendations for improving the functionality and public access to parks and recreation facilities in the City of Wildwood. The Studio will produce a green infrastructure plan and recreation land use analysis that provides creative solutions for the development of new and the redevelopment of existing public facilities that address the need for improved passive and active recreational infrastructure.

Students will conduct green infrastructure mapping and evaluation, analyze the historical development patterns and the current and planned developments within the city and across the region, evaluate connectivity among the passive and active recreational facilities within the city, and conduct public outreach to identify community needs related to recreational amenities in the city.

The School of Public
Administration at UCF is one of three schools in Florida to offer an undergraduate program in public administration. This semester, 215 students have enrolled in the program -- 67 in the B.A. program and 148 in the B.S. program. It is the second most popular major this semester with nonprofit management being the most popular major.

The Master of Public Administration program, in particular, received quite a bit of interest by prospective students, including many working professionals who are interested in seeking the degree to support their career development. Students seemed particularly interested in the fact that the program is accredited and is related to the graduate certificate programs in emergency management and in nonprofit management.

The minors are: nonprofit management, urban and regional planning, and emergency management and homeland security. Students can pursue the nonprofit management certificate as well.
