Sutton Presenting at APPAM Student Conference



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



Students interested in nonprofit management can explore this career field through two organizations: the Nonprofit Management Student Association and the Association of Fundraising Professionals.



SPA Tours NASA

Faculty and staff from the School of Public Administration made an educational visit to the Kennedy Space Center on Friday, February 10. The purpose of the visit was to familiarize members with changes taking place at the space center.

Since the end of the Space Shuttle Program, KSC is transitioning from a government-only facility to a multi-user spaceport. This change is the tangible outcome of federal policy and budget actions, which emphasizes commercial involvement in the Nation's space program.

After arriving at KSC, the group proceeded on a bus tour to and through Launch Complex 39. Historically, this launch complex was used by NASA for the Apollo and Space Shuttle Programs. Now, the signs of a multi-user launch complex are evident. Space-X is leasing one of the launch pads. The second pad is now a "clean pad" which means it is capable of launching different kinds of rockets. Boeing and the Air Force are housed in former Space Shuttle facilities.

NASA Engineer Shirish Patel served as the escort and discussed the changes the Center is going through. In terms of public administration, issues of collaboration, strategic planning, leading change and others are very prevalent. Following this

portion of the day, visits were made to view historical space activity such as the Apollo-Saturn Museum and the KSC Visitor Center.

During the month of February, we will shine a spotlight on our student organizations in the PA Weekly. We have organizations that are affiliated with each of our programmatic areas, providing students an opportunity to meet professionals in their respective career fields and to network with other like-minded peers. This week, ICMA president Marsha Noel highlights her organization.

"This week we are highlighting the Emergency Management Student Association, whose mission is to provide students with experience outside of the classroom. The group provides many opportunities for students to connect and to participate in events such as conferences, lectures and emergency management exercises.

The ICMA Student Chapter at UCF introduces students to the city/county manager profession by providing students with information and various opportunities offered by ICMA and the Florida City County Management Association. These opportunities include fellowships, internships, scholarships, weekly newsletters, webinars, job postings and so much more.

In 2016, the student chapter hosted a speaker series with assistant county administrators from Sarasota and Orange County. In addition, they provided a resume and interview workshop and attended the City of Orlando Budget Hearing. Urban Planning Students Present at Conference

In the early 1970s, students at UCF – then known as Florida Technological University – who wanted to study public administration had to go to the Department of Political Science, which offered a concentration in the subject. When close to half of the students from the political science department were graduating from that

track, the need for a degree in public administration became evident.

In 1975, the Bachelor of Arts in public administration debuted at FTU, along with the Department of Public Service Administration. At the time, there were only three faculty members and handful of students. Four decades later, the department, now known as the School of Public Administration, boasts a network of more than 4,800 alumni, more than 1,000 students and more than 30 faculty and staff members.

These achievements and more are being celebrated during the school's 40th Anniversary Family Reunion, which will take place at the Morgridge International Reading Center on Nov. 14. More than 150 people are expected to attend, including faculty, alumni, students, advisory board members, community partners and community leaders.

Presidential Management Fellowship

Before Lecturer Gregg Buckingham joined the School of Public Administration full time, he worked at NASA for 20 years. What he credits as the foundation of that two-decade career is the Presidential Management Fellowship. In this issue of the PA Weekly, he talks about his experience with the program and how it benefited him in the long-run:

"A professor brought the program to my attention as I was finishing my graduate degree. I already had a confirmed position in local government but I went ahead and applied, and am glad I did.

It was true then and true now you need a graduate degree to apply to the program. Its goal is much the same, as stated by the website: 'The PMF Program is a flagship leadership development program (for the federal government) at the entry level for advanced degree candidates. It was created more than three decades ago by Executive Order and has gone through many changes over the years. The program attracts and selects the best candidates possible, but is really designed with a more narrow focus - developing a cadre of potential government leaders.'

The first step was to send in an application. Candidates were chosen from among the applicants to participate in a full-day regional competition in Atlanta at their own expense. At this competition, a panel of judges reviewed each individual's participation at events during the day – a team exercise, a writing exercise, an interview, etc. Several weeks later I received a letter indicating selection into the program. A handbook with a list of federal agencies interested in hiring a PMI was provided. I scheduled about a dozen interviews in one week in Washington D.C. In a few weeks, letters or calls came from most of the agencies offering a PMI position. I selected NASA Headquarters in Washington D.C.

Once I began service with NASA, I was on a two-year internship, which led to full-time status with the agency. I started as a GS-9 and received a promotion each of the first two years to a GS-12. During those two years, I was able to do many developmental assignments outside the office that hired me. In addition to moving around NASA departments I also worked for the Congressional Research Service. I was also able to do a stint as an assistant to the NASA Administrator. These opportunities came as a result of being a PMI. In addition, the PMI program offered periodic retreats and training related to public administration.

The PMI program made all the difference in my career. At the conclusion of the two years, NASA hired me full time and I worked there for 28 years, both in Washington and at the Kennedy Space Center. It is an excellent door into the federal government, provided excellent career opportunities

and exposed us regularly to agency and wider senior governmental leaders. These opportunities, in turn, led to subsequent promotions and increased career responsibility – a real chance to make a difference and challenge myself. It is an excellent opportunity. Check it out!"

Interning in Washington D.C.

Graduate student Mya Harden, who is pursuing the MPA/MNM dual degree, recently completed an internship with the Department of Transportation in Washington D.C. In this issue of the PA Weekly, Harden shares her experience and how she's benefited from it:

"In Spring 2016, I began my search for a paid, rewarding and hands-on internship that would allow me to gain experience in the public sector. I initially hoped to find

an internship that would allow me to network and apply what I've learned during my studies in public administration, since I had previously interned a great deal in the nonprofit sector. I consulted with the school's internship coordinator about my preferences and the type of internship I wanted. After various searches, we found an internship: the Department of Transportation's Summer Transportation Internships for Diverse Groups (STIPDG) program. This paid internship program provides in-depth internships to students of all educational and demographic backgrounds in order to explore various careers in transportation. The perks of the internship were the stipend, paid housing and paid transportation to and from Washington D.C.

Now that I have completed the 10-week internship, I'd have to say that interning for the DOT was a rewarding experience. I had the opportunity to network and to weigh in on a lot of policy issues concerning DOT and its future in transportation innovation. One of the highlights of my experience was shadowing the Civil Rights Division of the Federal Transit Administration at DOT. It was eye-opening to find out how civil rights play a major role in transportation policy and decisions that are made concerning funding to state and local governments. In addition to the actual internship experience, being in D.C. exposed me to interactions with other federal agencies and organizations that provided further exploration into future career opportunities. The most memorable experience I had by far was being able to hear Democratic presidential nominee Hillary Rodham Clinton speak, and to network with many other elected officials.

The School of Public Administration and its internship program were instrumental in helping me to find the right internship for my desired preferences. As a result, I was able to have a rewarding experience and was exposed to career opportunities that I wouldn't have thought of otherwise."

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
