

## UCF Counselor Education Program Student Outcomes (2019-2020)

\* We do not designate full and part time students: whereas it generally takes a full-time student 7 full semesters to complete the program, this is not a mandatory plan of study. Therefore, to account for both full and part time students, we use a 4 year bench-mark from start to completion.

^ Based on 2019 scores, these pass rates represent those who passed the exam on their first attempt.

^ The National Board for Certified Counselors (NBCC) provides the State of Florida with exam pass rate information. In 2019, 61 UCF alumni took the National Clinical Mental Health Counselors Exam (NCMHCE) and 51 passed on their first attempt. As a comparison, for the entire state of Florida, the first-time pass rate of all test-takers in 2019 was 55%.

^^ The Association of Marital and Family Therapists Regulatory Boards (AMFTRB) provides the State of Florida with exam pass rate information. In 2019, 11 UCF alumni took the exam and 8 passed on their first attempt. As a comparison, for the entire state of Florida, the first-time pass rate of all test-takers in 2019 was 53%.

^^^ Students in the School Counseling track must pass their state qualifying exams during their internships and cannot graduate until they do so. Thus all students who graduate from the School Counseling track have passed their state qualifying exams.
