

his past year has been one of tremendous acclaim for the School of Public Administration. Our emergency management and nonprofit management programs were recognized among the top in their fields by the nation's most prestigious rankings guides, and several public affairs disciplines garnered competitive rankings as well. I am so proud to see that the incredible work of our faculty and staff continues to be noticed by the wider academic community.

If there is one thing I have been constantly reminded of, it's the unbelievable reach our school has on communities and scholarship around the world. School of Public Administration faculty have ventured around the world this year, sharing impactful research and providing thought leadership on topics from community resilience to interconnected governance.

Pegasus Professor Naim Kapucu spent Summer 2022 as the Fulbright Distinguished Chair in Applied Public Policy for the Heinz College at Carnegie Mellon University in Australia, in addition to conducting Fulbright research with colleagues at Flinders University in Adelaide.



Professor Thomas Bryer, Professor Abdul-Akeem Sadiq and Associate Professor Jungwon Yeo shared research with international colleagues at Kaunas University of Technology in Lithuania for the institution's Migration Crisis: Challenges and Possible Solutions conference in May.

Maritza Concha, lecturer and director of the UCF Center for Public and Nonprofit Management, hosted the inaugural Participatory Action Research and Evaluation Conference (PAREC), a virtual and fully bilingual event featuring prominent scholars and stakeholders from across Latin America. The conference aims to create sustainable development goals through participatory research that empowers the Latin American and Caribbean communities.

Professor Staci Zavattaro began a yearlong appointment as a prestigious Richard P. Nathan Public Policy Fellowship from the State University of New York's Rockefeller Institute of Government in September 2022. Zavattaro's research will focus on an often-overlooked facet of public administration in communities around the world: deathcare. From waning workforce numbers to mental health challenges, her research will aim to identify the profession's most pressing issues and present potential policy and resource interventions.

Pegasus Professor Naim Kapucu was inducted into the National Academy of Public Administration in November 2021 as part of the Academy's 2021 Class of Academy Fellows. One of 39 public administration scholars and professionals selected to join the Academy, Kapucu will focus his work with the organization's standing panel on intergovernmental systems. Kapucu is the third School of Public Administration faculty member to be inducted as a Fellow, joining Professors Kuotsai Tom Liou and Jeremy Hall.




ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

STUDENTS TAKE ADVANTAGE OF UCF'S INNOVATIVE



or many students, the prospect of studying abroad or pursuing dual undergraduate degrees comes with a cost: extra courses, extra semesters and extra expenses to squeeze that extra bit out of their college experience.

For School of Public
Administration students, however,
they can have their cake and eat
it too — academically speaking.
Through a landmark partnership with
Kaunas University of Technology
(KTU) in Lithuania, discerning
Knights are able to earn two
bachelor's degrees — one in public

administration conferred by KTU and one in nonprofit management conferred by UCF — simultaneously during a standard four-year plan of study that includes a semester abroad in Lithuania.

Beyond the study abroad experience of UCF students, the partnership between UCF and KTU extends both ways. In Fall 2022, UCF welcomed its first cohort of Lithuanian students studying at KTU for their semester abroad in the United States.

"It is such a privilege to be able to host such an engaged cohort of international students here at UCF," school director Doug Goodman says. "The value their diverse experiences will bring to our faculty and their fellow students' understanding of the concepts they're being taught, and how those concepts apply in communities around the world, cannot be understated."

Inspired by an idea sparked during a course at UCF, Austin Rivers launched a nonprofit organization in just a few years' time that is already making an impact. In 2020, Rivers founded Knit the Rainbow — a nonprofit organization that provides LGBTQ+ youth in the New York City area with handmade warm garments. In its first year, Knit the

Rainbow distributed more than 4,000 garments in its first year, earning significant local acclaim and an opportunity for Rivers to appear on The Kelly Clarkson Show.


THOMAS BRYER RECEIVES GLOBAL LITHUANIAN AWARD

Professor Thomas Bryer was honored by the government of Lithuania in December 2021 with the Global Lithuanian Award for his contributions to scientific progress. At the award ceremony, the President of Lithuania said honorees' contributions represented "symbols of patriotism and meaningful leadership." Bryer — a descendant of Lithuanian immigrants on both sides of his family — received the award for multiple professional endeavors in the Baltic state, most notably the international dual degree program he was instrumental in developing between UCF and Kaunas University of Technology.



UCF-LED TEAM DEVELOPS TOOL TO MAKE HOMEOWNERS

HAZARD AWARE!



More than 13 million U.S. homeowners now have instant digital access to critical disaster readiness information tailor-made for them, all free of charge, thanks to a team of researchers led by two UCF School of Public Administration faculty.

HazardAware is a free online tool that allows homeowners to input their address and view a custom "HazardReady" score — aggregating publicly available data on 15 potential threats, from hurricane winds and flooding to environmental vulnerability, community resilience and home construction factors. The tool is currently available to

homeowners in 196 counties along the Gulf of Mexico, including all 67 Florida counties and parts of Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas. The tool was developed as part of a larger \$3.4 million UCF-led, multi-institution project funded by the National Academies of Science, Engineering, and Medicine's Gulf Research Program.

"When people buy houses, they generally think about location, pricing, crime, walkability and things like that," says Christopher Emrich, principal investigator of the research and

the Boardman Endowed Associate Professor of Environmental Science and Public Administration at UCF. "But rarely do people think about how much hazards will cost. By going to HazardAware, people can compare houses and get more information they can use to make crucial decisions and smart choices about where they live."

With continued funding, Emrich says, HazardAware could be expanded to cover the entire United States and include additional hazard factors, including wildfires and earthquakes.

CLAIRE KNOX RECEIVES EDUCATION AWARD FROM FEMA

Claire Knox, associate professor and founding director of UCF's emergency management and homeland security program, was recognized by FEMA's Higher Education Program for her exceptional contributions to emergency management education with the agency's Kay C. Goss Innovation and Technology Award. Knox attributes her success in the field to the development of academic-practitioner partnerships, a cornerstone of both the FEMA Higher Education Program and UCF's emergency management degree programs.



RESEARCH SPOTLIGHT

SOCIAL MEDIA AND DISASTER RECOVERY

Published in Risk Analysis, a study conducted by school faculty Jungwon Yeo, Claire Knox and Qian Hu analyzed the impact of social media as a conduit of communication in the digital age, specifically through the lens of Twitter during the 2016 floods in southern Louisiana. Utilizing detailed analyses of longitudinal Twitter data from the period following the disaster, their research surmises that public agencies should place stronger emphasis on long-term recovery communication especially through trusted local channels — while also paying more attention to the information be distributed on social media platforms.



t the College of Community Innovation and Education's first annual Celebration Knight event in May 2022, GAI Consultants received the college's inaugural Pegasus Partner award. The award, which recognizes an individual or organization that has made significant

contributions to the advancement of the college through partnership, is awarded only once per year across the college's eight academic units and is selected based on a competitive nomination process.


"It is so exciting to have GAI be recognized as the college's first

RESEARCH SPOTLIGHT:

Implementing City Sustainability

rofessor Christopher Hawkins co-authored a new book, Implementing City Sustainability, which examines how local governments can move past traditional administrative pitfalls to pursue environmental, social and economic well-being within their communities. The book shows students that sustainability goals are not a one-size-fits-all solution, and to achieve them typically implies bending traditional function-based governance models in favor of an allhands-on-deck approach.



Students And **Professionals Matched For** Mentoring

ifteen students in the urban and regional planning graduate program had the opportunity to be paired with professional mentors the first week of October 2022 to further enrich their professional and academic development. Students were partnered with field professionals — planning managers and directors from across the public

and private sectors — from the Florida Chapter of the American Planning Association based on their field of interest. The mentorship program, which lasts approximately six months over an academic year, allows students to obtain insights about the planning profession while setting attainable goals based on mentors' real-world experience.



Celebrating 10 Years of MRA At UCF

he 2021-22 academic year marked the 10th year of the Master of Research Administration program at UCF. From humble beginnings as one of the nation's first dedicated research administration graduate degree programs, the past decade has seen the program blossom as the field extended beyond its academic roots into the broader professional world. Healthcare providers, consulting firms, nonprofit organizations and government agencies are all in the market for professional research administrators who can fill a variety of roles, including funding and budget management, grant writing, proposal review, contract negotiations and regulatory compliance.

"In today's instantaneous world, sustaining anything for 10 years can seem improbable, or impossible" says Angela White-Jones, lecturer and MRA academic program coordinator. "But when it comes to creating an academic practice and growing a profession, 10 years is something to celebrate and a wonderful achievement of which to build upon. We are proud to celebrate this anniversary of welcoming our first cohort."

One of the most game-changing aspects of the MRA program's success has come through its landmark partnership between the School of Public Administration and UCF Online. As part of the UCF Online family of programs, the MRA program is uniquely poised to reach national and global audiences with the student resources to back it up. UCF Online's success coaches act as a key factor in students' persistence and retention through the program, providing them with the support they need outside the virtual classroom.

Looking at the success the research administration program has

had in its inaugural decade, White-Jones points to the people whose vision brought the program into existence in the first place. Those include former SPA Director Mary Ann Feldheim and inaugural Program Coordinator Jo Smith, as well as a grant from the National Council of University Research Administrators that helped launch the program.

While the preceding decade brought many changes with it, White-Jones points to the three guiding constants that lie at the heart of the MRA program's current and future success — a commitment to creating highly skilled and ethical research administrators who excel in their field; a high standard in creating courses and curriculum that matters to students in the fast-changing world of research; and the sense of family that is created through the program's cohort model.

"With these principles rooted as strongly as ever in our program, we can't wait to see what the next 10 years have in store for this program," White-Jones says.



DOCTORAL STUDENT AWARDED FELLOWSHIP FOR DISSERTATION RESEARCH ON HISPANIOLA



ublic affairs doctoral student Ruth Kessa was named a Mellon Fellow by the University of Illinois Chicago's Crossing Latinidades Humanities Research Initiative, a partnership between the university and the Inter-University Program for Latino Research, Kessa's fellowship will assist her dissertation research on policymaking and disaster vulnerability within the nations of Hispaniola. Kessa, whose family heritage traces back to the island nations of Haiti and the Dominican Republic, wants to produce research that ultimately benefits the people of the island nations.

"Recovery efforts from the 2010 earthquake were stalled because of corruption and other policy challenges," Kessa says. "These issues make the whole island — Haiti and

the Dominican Republic — uniquely vulnerable to future natural disasters. If there is a way my research can help develop stronger policies and relationships between the two nations, I want to pursue it. We need to work together to respond to disasters."

Maritza Concha, lecturer and director of the Center for Public and Nonprofit Management, adds that Kessa's research is more important than ever. "The implications of Ruth's research will have great policy making implications for public administrators in the region," she says. "Intergovernmental relationships are extremely important in developing long-term solutions, especially as it relates to assisting vulnerable populations before, during and after disasters."

DOCTORAL STUDENT RECEIVES SOCIAL WORK FELLOWSHIP

Alexis Tsoukalas, a public affairs doctoral student, received the Social Work Doctoral Student Policy Fellowship from the Council on Social Work Education, Society for Social Work and Research and Group for the Advancement of Doctoral Education in Social Work. As part of the fellowship, Tsoukalas will be virtually matched with a U.S. Congressional office to provide research assistance on labor and immigration policy while receiving mentorship from federal policy practitioners.

In the year since my appointment as the CPNM Director, the center shifted its operations towards becoming financially sustainable. We were to achieve this without changing its mission of promoting research and leading public service projects that will ultimately impact and strengthen communities. In this transition, we expanded community partnerships, delivered academic and practitioner conferences, and initiate new projects to build the capacity of great nonprofit organizations.

I would like to tell you about some of the CPNM's accomplishments:

- Launched our first Nonprofit Professional Certificate Program in collaboration with the Nonprofit Leadership Alliance (NLA) and UCF Continuing Education. This certificate will allow nonprofit professionals to obtain the Nonprofit Professional Credential offered by NLA.
- Hosted the first international Participatory Action Research and Evaluation Conference (PAREC), with more than 250 participants, in collaboration with an international committee from the Latin American & Caribbean region and the United Nations Development Program.
- Facilitated a capacity building seminar funded by the Orange County Citizens' Commission for Children for the eighth time.
- Coordinated the Nonprofit Conference and the Public Administration Research Conference showcasing academic projects from our faculty, students, public and nonprofit sector.
- Received funding totaling more than \$600,000 to continue empowering the public and nonprofit sector in areas of capacity building and professional enhancement.

I would like to end this letter by thanking Dr. Young-joo Lee, Dr. Stephanie Krick and Dr. Daniel Seigler for their support with CPNM projects. I also want to extend a special thanks to Dr. Doug Goodman for his continued support and trust. Finally, please join me in appreciating the excellent work and commitment of CPNM graduate assistant, Rasha Mannaa, and undergraduate assistant, Jackson Brown. The success of this first year is the reflection of Ms. Mannaa and Mr. Brown's dedication, work ethic and continued professional growth.

We look forward to working with all of you in the future.

Capacity Building Seminar



or the eighth consecutive year, CPNM launched the capacity building seminar during the summer of 2022, funded by Orange County Citizens' Commission for Children (OCCC). The 2022 capacity building seminar cohort was composed of 40 participants from 20 Orange County nonprofit organizations. The primary goal of the seminar is to provide essential training to participating nonprofit organizations, equipping them to successfully compete for Orange County funding and external funding venues. The training seminar covers topics related to governance, strategic planning, evaluation, financial management and grant writing as well as technical assistance led by UCF graduate students.

As part of this program, CPNM staff facilitated a program evaluation to measure preliminary impact and best practices.

It was found that all participating agencies (100%) were satisfied with the program with an attendance rate of almost 90%. More than 85% also indicated to have increased knowledge in all seminar topics. With more than 600 hours dedicated to technical assistance, participants felt this program would bring positive change to their organizations. One participant stated the importance of participating in this training as reflected in this quote: "Recapping and reliving the story of how the organization was created, the mission and where we come from. Passion turned into purpose." The CPNM plans to host the capacity building seminar with OCCCC over the next three years and will perform a follow up study to document participants' grants acceptance rate. Participatory Action Research Evaluation Conference (PAREC)

asha Mannaa, graduate research assistant at CPNM, served as the Program Coordinator for the first international Participatory Action Research Evaluation Conference (PAREC). PAREC's theme was: "Working towards the Sustainable Development Goals through participatory research and evaluation empowering the Latin America and Caribbean community." The conference took place in April of 2022, in collaboration with an international committee, and CPNM staff who planned and

executed this first bilingual conference for CPNM and the School of Public Administration. The conference had a total of nine panel discussions focusing on the following tracks within participatory evaluation: 1) values and standards, 2) theoretical frameworks and methods, and 3) application and experiences. Speakers included experts in evaluation from the region as well as from the UNDP Independent Evaluation Office leadership. More than 250 participants (evaluators, students, and academics) from

Latin American, the Caribbean and the United States participated in this one-day event. The conference was well received as stated in this participant's comment: "Very enriching experience, I would have liked it to be extended for two days to be able to go deeper into the topics and network with peers." The Center plans to coordinate this conference every two years expanding to other regions of the world.






















EMINENT SCHOLAR SERIES



On November 9, 2022, CPNM invited Dr. Pablo Rodriguez-Bilella, CONICET Faculty of Social Sciences National University of San Juan, Argentina to present in the Eminent Scholar Series for the fall 2021. In his presentation entitled: Participatory evaluation in Latin America: principles and good practices, Dr. Rodriguez-Billela discussed participatory evaluation functions as an approach that enables programs to be reviewed and improved from a local perspective, opening up new spaces for understanding and dialogue, deemed particularly necessary in pandemic times.



On March 24th, 2022, CPNM held a discussion with accomplished UCF Alum, Mr. Scott Jenkins, the Strategy Director for State Policy at the Lumina Foundation. This is an independent, private foundation in Indianapolis that is committed to making opportunities for learning beyond high school available to all. In this role, he leads the development and advancement of the foundation's state policy agenda.



On March 25th, 2022, CPNM held the Public Administration Research Conference with Keynote Speaker Dr. David Fetterman. Dr. Fetterman spoke about empowerment evaluation, social equity and inclusion strategies for both public and nonprofit sectors.

The theme of the conference was "Hope and Humanity in Central Florida." This conference attracted 150 attendees participating over the span of 10 sessions. The event was held on a virtual conference platform that Jackson was entirely responsible for populating, monitoring, and updating. This event was co-organized by the Nonprofit Advisory Board.

The 16th annual Public Administration Research Conference (PARC) took place March 24th & 25th, 2022. The 2022 PARC theme was: "Promoting broadened prosperity, social equity, community resilience, and inclusive governance through policy reform and public service from local to global initiatives." The first day was hosted at UCF downtown and included pre-conference workshops, an Eminent scholar lecture, student research posters, and a social event organized by student organizations. This event was particularly monumental because it marked the first time that the School of Public Administration was able to host an in person since the start of the pandemic. The PARC panels took place virtually the following day using the same virtual conference platform that was utilized for the Nonprofit Partners Conference. 
